
Coffee & Chat

Shop with Scrip



OK, it is early, but have you thought about giving gift cards as holiday gifts? You can really support our branch activities by purchasing gift cards at www.shopwithscrip. You just pay the usual value of the gift card, but the nice thing is that our AAUW branch then receives a kick-back percentage of the cost varying from 2% to 11%. Last year the branch netted \$219.90 on sales of \$4,750. As an example, if you purchased a \$50 gift card, you would send AAUW branch the \$50, and we would order you the card and there would be the full \$50 available on it. BUT, the Scrip company would then send the branch \$2, if the rebate percentage was 4%, or \$4 if the percentage was 8%.

More than 600 companies have gift cards available. Examples are Cabela's (3%), Lowe's (4%), Home Depot (4%), Wal-Mart (2.5%), Amazon.com (3%), and Barnes & Noble (9%). There are cards for groceries, restaurants, travel, almost anything you could use.

You can order on line by setting up an account. If you need help with instructions, contact Marilyn Zimmerman at mz812@earthlink.net or calling 314-7482. She can also order for you.

After ordering, the company mails all the cards to Marilyn. Orders received by the 25th of each month, will be available at the next AAUW General Program Meeting.



Branch Financial News

Our Grand Junction Branch of AAUW finished the 2014-2015 fiscal year (which ended on June 30, 2015) in great financial shape.

The **General Fund** started the year with a balance of \$2,974.37. Income during the year consisted of local dues of \$610, a donation of \$75, and Scrip sales of \$5,170. Expenses paid were \$4,962.50 to the Scrip company, \$42.60 to mail our newsletter to those without email, \$159.30 to print newsletters, \$19.60 for membership expenses, \$175 for insurance, \$64.90 to print yearbooks and mail, \$80.15 for program expenses, and \$7.24 to reimburse officer expenses. The year ended with a checkbook **balance of \$3,318.28.**

The **Money Market Account** consists of several funds. Overall it started the year with a balance of \$7,757.65. Interest was added in the amount of \$3.81 (Wow! Great rate, huh!). Expenses for Cocktails & Conversation events were paid in the amount of \$106.79, and \$100 was sent to CMU Foundation to even the amount for a scholarship. (The balance was paid from the AAUW endowment funds already at the Foundation). The ending **balance was \$7,554.67.**

The remaining balances in the funds are: Scholarship \$ 629.86; Miscellaneous \$200.22; General Fund Reserves \$1,500.00; McClure Bequest \$5,224.59.

AAUW Public Policy Program 2015-2017

Every two years the Public Policy Program is reviewed, updated and voted on by the membership of AAUW. The Public Policy program supports AAUW's mission of advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research and speaks to women's needs, aspirations, and concerns across the life span.

The Biennial Action Priorities inform state and local action. The priorities for national action are chosen according to the criteria of visibility, critical need, strong member support, and potential for distinctive AAUW contribution or leadership.

There are **three main priorities** with a number of items under each priority:

1. To support a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity, and diversity.
2. Achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women.
3. To guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse society.

After concluding the usual business of adoption of a budget, approving updates of the strategic plan and public policy program, and various reports, the balance of the conference was focused on developing AAUW mission-based branch programming, marketing our brand, and collaboration with other organizations. Attendees broke into groups and brainstormed ideas...wow, just goes to prove that many heads are better than one. We hope to incorporate some of the suggestions in upcoming meetings here in GJ. This was a great meeting to get really jazzed about AAUW.
