This will be an interactive event, allowing for audience engagement. Participants will be given a color code which corresponds to a certain table; moderators will then rotate among the tables at predetermined times, allowing everyone to participate in each topic discussion. Topics will be:

#### Trash Burning .....Moderator...Kristin Winn

According to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, open trash burning is detrimental to public health, the environment and air quality. Results from Mesa County survey on open burning will be presented.

Air Quality Monitoring Project....Moderator...Jerry Nelson, Ph.D.

Thanks to a grant from Desert Ecology Analysis & Restoration, several air quality monitors have been placed throughout the Grand Valley to discover pollution sources. Results of the monitoring will be discussed.

**Deer Creek Oil & Gas Waste Water Pits**.....Moderator...Resident from Whitewater Discussion of findings of the air quality monitors at the site, what has been done to alleviate the odor problem, the impact on residents, and possible future solutions.

As we know, the air quality in the Grand Valley is not as pristine as it once was. This forum offers a chance for us to become better educated on the problems we all face as residents.

Plan to arrive early as last year's event was well-attended.

# **Shop with Scrip**

Have you ordered Scrip cards recently? You can really support our branch activities by purchasing gift cards at <u>www.shopwithscrip</u>. And just think, you do not have to worry about identify theft if you pay for purchases with one of these gift cards.

You just pay the usual value of the gift card, but the nice thing is that our AAUW branch then receives a kick-back percentage of the cost varying from 2% to 11%. As an example, if you ordered a \$50 gift card, you would send our AAUW branch the \$50. Later the Scrip Company takes the money from our branch checking account, less the rebate percentage, and mails the card to Marilyn who then gives you your gift card with the full \$50 available on it. Orders received by the 25<sup>th</sup> of each month, will be available at the next AAUW General Program Meeting.

More than 600 companies have gift cards available. Examples are Cabela's (3%), Lowe's (4%), Home Depot (4%), Wal-Mart (2.5%), Amazon.com (3%), and Barnes & Noble (9%). There are cards for groceries, restaurants, travel, almost anything you could use.

### **SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS**

This fall communities around the state and country hold school board elections. While many of us no longer have children in our local schools, we should still be concerned about school board elections as members of AAUW.

One of AAUW's Public Policy Priorities is:

"To support a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity, and diversity."

In assessing candidates running for the local school board you will want to know where they stand on issues that AAUW supports.

AAUW Advocates:

- Adequate and equitable funding for quality public education for all students.
- Opposition to the use of public funds for nonpublic elementary and secondary education and to charter schools that do not adhere to the same civil rights and accountability standards as required of other public schools.
- Protection of programs that meet the needs of girls and women in elementary, secondary, and postsecondary education, including strong promotion of STEM education and sex education.
- Vigorous enforcement of Title IX and all other civil rights laws pertaining to education.
- Increased support for and access to affordable higher education for women and disadvantaged populations.
- Increased support for programs that break through barriers for women and girls in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields.

Be sure you make your voice heard by voting in upcoming school board elections. You should also encourage others to vote and in particular encourage young voters to be sure they are registered to vote and to vote.
