Domestic Violence and its Effect on Women Financially

November is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Our presenter, **Theresa McKenzie**, is well-qualified to speak on the topic since she works as the Volunteer and Special Event Coordinator - Domestic Violence Services @ Hilltop Community Resources. Hilltop operates Latimer House, the shelter for victims of domestic violence.

Theresa has 17 years of experience in the arena of volunteer and event management. Nothing rewards her more than helping a volunteer find his or her service "sweet spot"—a skill that's abundantly evident in the passionate people who've grown into influential, effective leaders under her mentorship.

Theresa began her volunteer leadership career at Mesa, Arizona's, Central Christian Church as the director of First Impressions, the ministry responsible—as the name implies—for making attenders feel welcome at each of this mega-church's multiple campuses. In 2010, Theresa migrated to House of Refuge, a transitional housing program, also in Mesa. There she managed and motivated all volunteers and all volunteer events for this community of 88 single-family homes. Many of the events included upwards of 200 volunteers in one-day housing improvement projects.

Now the community relations and volunteer coordinator for Hilltop's Domestic Violence Services, Theresa is excited to bring her passion—connecting volunteers with their sweet spot—to Hilltop's mission to serve the communities of Grand Junction, Delta, Montrose, Ouray and the surrounding areas.



Named one of Amazon's <u>Best Books of the Month, August 2012</u>: Tom Sherbourne is a lighthouse keeper on Janus Rock, a tiny island a half day's boat journey from the coast of Western Australia. When a baby washes up in a rowboat, he and his young wife Isabel decide to raise the child as their own. The baby seems like a gift from God, and the couple's reasoning for keeping her seduces the reader into entering the waters of treacherous morality even as Tom--whose moral code withstood the horrors of World War I--begins to waver. M. L. Stedman's vivid characters and gorgeous descriptions of the solitude of Janus Rock and of the unpredictable Australian frontier create a perfect backdrop for the tale of longing, loss, and the overwhelming love for a child that is *The Light Between Oceans*.

AAUW's <u>The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap</u> is here, and the fall edition of the report has more truth in it than ever. How do we explain the 20-cent gender pay gap (a statistically insignificant change from last year), and what do race, location, and career choice have to do with it? See how the gap in your state stacks up to the national number, and learn more about what states are doing to promote (or hinder) equal pay. Plus, new for this edition, we discuss how the gender pay gap is connected to disability, sexual orientation, and gender identity.

This is What AAUW Is Doing Nationally

Elect Her is the only program in the country that encourages and trains college women to run for student government and future political office. A collaboration between AAUW and Running Start, **Elect Her** addresses the need to expand the pipeline of women candidates and to diminish the longstanding political leadership gender gap.

Elect Her is a one-day, 4.5-hour training. Participants practice hands-on campaign skills, hear from inspiring local speakers, and discuss research on women in government.

Women make up a majority of the electorate, yet they have never been equally represented in the halls of power. Engaging women in politics and electing them to office earlier in life are the key to strengthening and increasing women's representation in government. In fact, 56 percent of women in the current U.S. Congress started their leadership careers in student government.

An important part of encouraging young women to step up and lead starts with participation in student government. Over 1,000 students attended an **Elect Her** workshop on 50 campuses in 2015. 76 percent of 2015 participants who reported running for student office WON!

Order your Holiday gift cards now!!! Place your orders by the 25th of November. Since there will be no December Program Meeting, special deliveries will be made after December 5.

You can support our branch activities by purchasing gift cards at www.shopwithscrip.com. You just pay the usual value of the gift card, but our AAUW branch then receives a kick-back percentage of the cost varying from 2% to 11%. As an example, if you purchased a \$50 gift card, you would send the AAUW branch treasurer \$50, and she would order the card and there would be the full \$50. BUT, the Scrip company would then send the branch \$2, if the rebate percentage was 4%, or \$4 if the percentage was 8%.

To see what is available, go to www.shopwithscrip.com and hit the "retailers" tab at the top of the page. There are gift cards for groceries, restaurants, travel, almost anything you could use.
