### Message from the Branch President

The board has been busy with not only programs, but also trying to reach out to the public to grow our membership. Our Mission is: "AAUW advances equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research." We are working hard to reach out to women who are attending Colorado Mesa University (CMU) and Western Colorado Community College (WCCC), to provide not only the long standing scholarships our branch has funded, but also to advocate and be a support system for them.

We are attempting to be diverse, by offering programs in different locations, at different times to reach out to career women who may not have time to attend program meetings at the times which we are most comfortable with. This is in addition to finding locations that we can offer "snacks" instead of expecting you to pay for a meal. Dr. Jeannie Dunn has found two very nice rooms for the last two program meetings, and also provided a wonderful array of finger foods. All we have asked for is a love donation to offset the cost of the finger foods. If you missed either of the last two meetings, you missed out on amazing speakers.

We have very carefully planned out a budget for the 2017-18 membership year. In our budget, we have set aside funds for at least two board members to attend each state level conference. This includes the Fall Leadership Conference, Public Policy Day and the Spring Conference. We have also had to increase our budget for the cost of printing and mailing our newsletters. We are going to have to transfer almost \$1200 from our reserves to meet this budget cycle. Unfortunately, because not many of us participate (myself included) in the "Shop with Scrip" fundraiser that our branch has, our annual income has decreased greatly.

Apparently, there is a food pantry on the university campus, where students are allowed to get what they need. I am waiting to hear how we could donate to this food pantry.

Jeannie does need RSVP's and the cost for members is \$12/person. It would be nice if all of you could attend to be supportive of our students, who are our potential future members.

**FYI** The Culinary Arts program at W.C.C.C. emphasizes techniques of the modern culinary kitchen. Students learn cooking and baking from scratch skills for soups, sauces, meat and seafood production, yeast-raised breads, cakes, pies, and pastries. The program focuses on the fundamentals of nutrition, menu planning, cost control, purchasing, marketing, safety, and sanitation. Students gain practical experience in cooking, dining room management and beverage service in **Chez Lena**, the student-operated restaurant.

# Mat You May Have Missed

**October 2<sup>nd</sup> – AAUW's General Program Meeting** was held at School District 51's Career Center with beverages, and a delicious array of cheeses and fruits with crackers, provided by VP Membership Jeannie Dunn

Our very interesting and informative speaker Tony Giurado is currently the District Compliance Officer for Mesa County Valley School District 51. As such he handles most of the charges of any type of discrimination, not necessarily just those related to Title IX. The Athletic Director may handle some other cases in his department. Both report directly to the Superintendent of the District.

Mr. Giurado presented handouts of the district policy for faculty and staff regarding nondiscrimination, as well as pages from the Student and Parent Handbook on the same issues. The handouts also indicate the procedures for filing any complaints.

Complaints may informal, in which case Tony attempts to resolve the issue at meetings with the involved parties. He then makes recommendations to the Superintendent for any actions. Parties may also file a formal complaint, which involves additional paperwork. A formal hearing is held, with Tony again making recommendations to the Superintendent. If the parties are still unsatisfied, they may make an appeal. Informal complaints can at any point be upgraded to a formal complaint. Generic examples were provided.

We all left with a greater appreciation of the work being done by the school district to end discrimination.

## Coffee & Chat



Meet Ove. He's a curmudgeon—the kind of man who points at people he dislikes as if they were burglars caught outside his bedroom window. He has staunch principles, strict routines, and a short fuse. People call him "the bitter neighbor from hell." But must Ove be bitter just because he doesn't walk around with a smile plastered to his face all the time?

Behind the cranky exterior there is a story and a sadness. So when one November morning a chatty young couple with two chatty young daughters move in next door and accidentally flatten Ove's mailbox, it is the lead-in to a comical and heartwarming tale of unkempt cats, unexpected friendship, and the ancient art of backing up a U-Haul. All of which will change one cranky old man and a local residents' association to their very foundations.

A feel-good story, Fredrik Backman's novel about the angry old man next door is a thoughtful exploration of the profound impact one life has on countless others. "If there was an award for 'Most Charming Book of the Year,' this first novel by a Swedish blogger-turned-overnight-sensation would win hands down".

#### **Be Aware of the Scam Artists**

Within hours of each other, I was an intended target of two different scams. One was an email supposedly from me sent to our incredibly intelligent treasurer Jane, who THANKFULLY called me and asked about it. I immediately knew it was a scam, and advised Jane to not disburse any funds (which she would not have anyway).

The other was a phone call (on my house phone) supposedly from my grandson who had broken his nose in a car accident in the Dominic Republic. He asked that I "keep this just between us" and "not share it" with anyone. Knowing that my just turned 16 year old grandson would not be in the Dominic Republic driving a car - I knew it was a scam.

Please be aware that any phone call or email asking you to give money, or send gift cards, or .... give them your checking account numbers, or your credit card numbers is MOST LIKELY a scam. Always ask for a number that you can call them back on, and verify the information. I cannot tell you how many times my husband had to go to the bank with his mother to close a checking account because she gave out her account number to someone who called.

Please be aware! Be smart! And, feel free to just say **NOT TODAY!**
