

Our February speaker will be Kelly Weeks who is a lifelong resident of Colorado, attending local public schools and graduating from R-5 High School in 1984. After years of working at various jobs, none of which was totally fulfilling, she took an aide position at her old high school, R-5.

Soon she was encouraged to become a teacher which meant needing college. So, at age 34 she started at Colorado Christian University and in two and a half years had a Bachelor's degree in Organizational Management. Kelly then went on to get a Secondary English Teaching Credential from Western State College and an ACE (Alternative Cooperative Education) Credential from Colorado State University. Finally, she earned a Master's in Special Education from University of Northern Colorado just about the time she turned 40.



After spending 15 years at R-5 High School, Kelly transferred over to the Career Center's InSTEPS (Individualized Student-centered Employment Program Services) in 2016. This is the district's transition program for students 18-21 years old with significant cognitive delays. She collaborates with families, businesses, and community agencies to provide job placement opportunities for her students. With the students, she practices life, social and vocational skills, as well as having fun.

Kelly's daughter Melissa is now 24, and continues to live in Grand Junction. She is an aspiring artist and has had her work displayed in local venues. Kelly lives with her partner of four years, Mike, and enjoys traveling in their little camper and hiking. Recently, they have been exploring National Parks during the summers or spring breaks. They also love baseball! She and Mike are unified players with local Special Olympics teams or you might also see us at JUCO, G.J. Rockies or at the Colorado Rockies games.

## What You May Have Missed Last Month

Our speaker for the January meeting was Kelly Reuss, Director of Student Services at Western Colorado Community College. Prior to starting this position last Fall, Kelly worked on the CMU campus setting up the IRIS (Integrated Resources for Information and Solutions) Program. CMU had noticed that incoming students were frequently not aware of what all was available to them, and when problems occurred, were dropping out of school. Once IRIS was functioning everything a new student needs is at a one-stop place...administration, financial aid, advisors, mentors. Tuition can even be arranged to be paid monthly, interest free.

AT WCCC, Kelly started with an open door policy for her office, so that students would not be intimidated. She is working to get IDRS implemented there. We were unaware that WCCC now has programs whereby high school students can take classes at WCCC. Also, high school sophomores are now taking tours of tech classes to experience other occupations.

There were also guest speakers to encourage us to sign up for New Dimensions classes and to provide information about the proposed GJ Community Center. The following was provided by organizer Susan Capps:

#### **GJ Community Center?**

On April 2nd, residents of Grand Junction will finally get to vote on whether or not it's time for a community center.

The Community Center proposal on April's ballot includes three main components:

- A 98,000 sq. ft. community center located at Matchett Park. This will include: warm-water, lap, and leisure pools; 2 pool-party rooms; a 3-court gymnasium; an indoor walking track; 3 multipurpose meeting rooms; gathering spaces; a bouldering wall; fitness areas; child supervision services; tenant lease space.
- **75 acres of park development** at Matchett including: 7 multi-purpose fields; walking paths; a plaza; playgrounds; restrooms/shelters; 4 basketball courts;12 pickleball courts; 8 tennis courts; a pond; a skatepark.
- Renovation of the existing Orchard Mesa pool, gymnasium, and adjoining facilities. Additions include: a new social zone with snack bar; family dressing areas; 2 multi-purpose rooms; a pool-party room; a new spa.

If approved, the community center, park development, and renovation/expansion at Orchard Mesa will be funded by a 0.39% city sales tax increase. That tax would not apply to unprepared food, gas, prescriptions, or services. The average household in Grand Junction would pay approximately \$4.39 per month, and this will cover the cost of construction and ongoing operations and maintenance.

There's a lot of work to be done to make this Community Center a reality. To get the vote out the campaign needs help with yard signs, phone bank, office work, house parties, call trees, neighborhood canvassing, snacks. Anyone who would like to help, please contact: gicommunitycenter.org.

#### February's Read: The Hundred-Foot Journey by Richard C. Morais

"That skinny Indian teenager has that mysterious something that comes along once a generation. He is one of those rare chefs who is simply born. He is an artist."

And so begins the rise of Hassan Haji, the unlikely gourmand who recounts his life's journey in Richard Morais's charming novel, The Hundred-Foot Journey. Lively and brimming with the colors, flavors, and

> scents of the kitchen, The Hundred-Foot Journey is a succulent treat about family, nationality, and the mysteries of good taste.



When tragedy pushes the family out of India, they console themselves by eating their way around the world, eventually settling in Lumière, a small village in the French Alps. They open an inexpensive Indian restaurant opposite an esteemed French relais—that of the famous chef Madame Mallory—and infuse the sleepy town with the spices of India, transforming the lives of its eccentric villagers and infuriating their celebrated neighbor. Only after Madame Mallory wages culinary war with the immigrant family, does she finally agree to mentor young Hassan, leading him to Paris, the launch of his own restaurant, and a slew of new adventures.

The Hundred-Foot Journey is about how the hundred-foot distance between a new Indian kitchen and a traditional French one can represent the gulf between different cultures and desires.
