### NOTIFICATION of CHANGES TO BRANCH POLICIES

We have been directed by National to change our Branch Policies. We need to remove Paragraph 2 as Branch Participants are not allowed. We additionally need to clarify that visitors may only attend 2 interest group meetings before they are expected to join the branch as a fully vested member of AAUW. As a result, we are removing the words "or general program/membership meetings" from Paragraph 1 under Membership.

Our understanding is that since this is under the direction of AAUW National, we are not required to vote on the changes. Please make the following changes in your 2017-2018 branch yearbook on page 23.

### **POLICIES**

### 1. Membership

Those eligible for membership in AAUW may not attend more than 2 interest group or general program/membership-meetings unless they join the branch. If a member chooses not to continue to pay their dues, they may not continue to attend meetings, including special interest group meetings.

#### 2. Branch Participants

As a community outreach service, the branch offers participant status to those who are ineligible for membership but who attend our activities and share our AAUW goals and objectives and work with us to achieve them, and through their participation, offer us another means to network with other women's groups in the community. Branch participants are not members of AAUW and may not hold office or chair any interest group. Branch participants pay only the dues amount approved by the Board, currently \$25.

This was complicated locally because most of those who are currently branch participants did not realize that they actually meet the current qualifications to be full members of AAUW. Currently, membership in AAUW is open to any\* graduate holding an **associate** or **equivalent**, baccalaureate, or higher degree from a regionally accredited institution.

What does this mean to us, here in Grand Junction? It means that those who have enjoyed being only "Branch Participants" will need to complete a membership application form (so that we have the info to send to National). Jane or I can assist with this. The completed application should be sent to Jane with the now required \$87 full member annual dues (\$59 to National, \$10 to State and \$18 to the GJ branch) prior to July 1<sup>st</sup>.

One of our great successes is really because Jeannie Dunn thought outside of the box. She planned a fall program meeting where we honored our scholarship recipients. As a result of several young women attending that event, we finally have an official College and University Partnership with Colorado Mesa University. Lehua La'a, Annessa Bryant and Tatiana Lopez have all taken on leadership roles in the AAUW GJ - CMU group. They have been busy raising funds, applying for different opportunities to expand their horizons with AAUW, and planning future events. This goes to prove that change often starts best from the bottom up.

The board will soon begin planning next year's programs. We invite you to share your ideas, wants and needs for a successful 2018-19 membership year.



As soon as they arrived at Thula Thula they started planning their escape...As Lawrence battled to create a bond with the elephants and save them from execution, he came to realize that they had a lot to teach him about life, loyalty and

freedom. Set against the background of life on the reserve, with unforgettable characters and exotic wildlife, this is a delightful book that will appeal to animal lovers everywhere.


