Campus Initiatives

Each year, AAUW's several campus leadership programs shape the lives of thousands of college women to be the next generation of leaders. One such program is the **AAUW Campus Action Project.** Students who belong to the AAUW college/university partners program will receive priority application preference for AAUW Campus Action Projects.

AAUW Campus Action Project (CAP) grants award 10–12 campus teams up to \$5,000 to implement initiatives that promote women's leadership. CAP teams of students, faculty, and staff join forces to combat the gender leadership gap.

What is the gender leadership gap?

From Capitol Hill to corporate boardrooms, women are much less likely than men to hold leadership positions in their fields. Despite impressive gains for women in education and the workplace throughout the past 50 years, the gender leadership gap still leaves all women greatly outnumbered in top positions. Women of color, who are affected by both racial and gender discrimination, are especially underrepresented in these roles: Fewer than 3 percent of board directors at Fortune 500 companies, for example, are Asian, black, or Hispanic women. What can the campus teams do about it?

They can end the tired gender stereotypes that hold women back. They can show their community that gender parity is a step forward for everyone by applying for a \$5,000 grant to amplify their voice and empower women leaders in their community.

All they need to do is pick a team, pick their project, and apply!

Previous CAP teams have implemented mentorship programs, created networking events, and brought inspirational guest speakers to campus to achieve their goals. Other teams have shown their creativity through artistic visual campaigns or spoken word performances.

For example: The 2017–17 University of Dar es Salaam CAP team created a program to support women leaders on their campus. The 2014–15 University of Maryland, Baltimore County, CAP team created a visual campaign and hosted an event that empowered women of color on their campus. The 2015–16 Trinity College CAP team partnered with their local Girl Scouts troop to promote science, technology, engineering, and math.



September's read is Leonardo da Vinci...by Walter Isaacson

Based on thousands of pages from Leonardo's astonishing notebooks and new discoveries about his life



and work, Walter Isaacson weaves a narrative that connects his art to his science. He shows how Leonardo's genius was based on skills we can improve in ourselves, such as passionate curiosity, careful observation, and an imagination so playful that it flirted with fantasy. He produced the two most famous paintings in history, The Last Supper and the Mona Lisa. But in his own mind, he was just as much a man of science and technology. With a passion that sometimes became obsessive, he pursued innovative studies of anatomy, fossils, birds, the heart, flying machines, botany, geology, and weaponry. His ability to stand at the crossroads of the humanities and the sciences, made iconic by his drawing of Vitruvian Man, made him history's most creative genius

Leonardo's delight at combining diverse passions remains the ultimate recipe for creativity. So, too, does his ease at being a bit of a misfit: illegitimate, gay, vegetarian, left-handed, easily distracted, and at times heretical. His life should remind us of the importance of instilling, both in ourselves and our children, not just received knowledge but a willingness to question it—to be imaginative and, like talented misfits and rebels in any era, to think differently.

\$ Branch Financial News

The Branch maintains two accounts at Alpine Bank. One is the **General Fund** which is used for on-going income and expenses. The previous page shows in the first left-hand column what the Branch budgeted for income & expenses for the 2018-2019 fiscal year (runs from July 1 through June 30). The next column is what was actually taken-in/spent. Notice that many Board officers choose not to claim their full expenses. The column on the right represents what the Board approved as a budget for the coming year.

You will notice that last year, and again this coming year, that because of lower income we were forced to move money in from a reserve account to cover expenses. This year we hope to reverse this trend by significantly increasing branch membership. Therefore, **we NEED each of you** who attend the upcoming brunch or a general program meeting or a book group to bring along several prospective new members, or even just friends or relatives that we can expose to the idea of AAUW.

The other Branch account is a **Money-Market** account, which is separated into 3 sub-funds: General Fund Reserves, McClure Bequest (set-aside for activities to increase branch visibility and membership), and Miscellaneous. This year the Reserves account started with \$3,000, and ended with \$2,500 after monies were transferred to the General Fund. The McClure Bequest started with \$4,708.30 and ended with \$4,208.30, with \$500 used for the CMU Women Vet Scholarship. The Miscellaneous fund started with \$3.85 and grew to a whopping \$8.70 due to interest earned on the account.
