Last Month's Meeting



We were all so impressed with the energy and accomplishments of guest speaker, Heidi Ragsdale.

She worked at West Middle School before becoming ill. She is now a National Geographic affiliate and is a founding member of Geo Maker Institute, a National Geographic Society-supported training institute that promotes the understanding of GIS, the power of geography, and the building of sustainable ideas by training educators in techo-engineering systems like Tinkercad, which can be taught to students in the classroom. The Geo Maker Institute offers a four-week course where trainees make a story map of projects and how they are important. Training like enables teachers to take this knowledge and spread it to rural areas. School funding is often limited, and GMI pays to have the educators come learn. The institute is also supported by MakerSpace, which is located in Orchard Mesa. Membership is \$50, but people have the option of just taking classes there.

Other projects with which she is involved are "Where is Web?" which are updates about the newest space telescope, and "No Zipcode Left Behind," which is what allows GMI's training to be offered to those in rural communities. All projects are great for a school's budget as costs don't come from the school or teachers' pockets.

Latin-Anglo Association is an after-school program that also helps students from low-income housing gain access to training in STEM as it provides scholarships as well. The association hosts Grand Junction's Cinco de Mayo event and their funds are increased through a golf tournament. This will be their 50th year anniversary and hope to have 50 teams participating in honor of that.

Heidi is also involved with Delta Kappa Gamma, presiding at president. There are two chapters in town, and she affectionately called her chapter the "fun chapter".
