If you haven't yet contributed, it couldn't be easier! All donations made by Dec 31, 2021 (entered on website by midnight, or by check dated Dec 31 or earlier) are tax-deductible in 2021.

Giving Opportunities for 2021

2021 Above-the-Line Charitable Contributions

This year, thanks to the CARES Act, donors may take an above the line deduction for cash donations of up to \$300 (individual) or \$600 (joint returns), even if they do not otherwise itemize deductions.

Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from Retirement Account

The IRS mandates that older individuals take RMDs from their IRA each year after a certain age. These required withdrawals are subject to ordinary income tax. By making a charitable contribution from your IRA, you can satisfy the RMD requirement without reporting additional income.

Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD)

Donors who do itemize deductions may make a direct transfer of funds from an IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity and deduct up to 100% of their adjusted gross income. (Previously limited to 60 %.) QCDs can be counted toward satisfying required minimum distributions for the year when certain rules are met.
