#### A visit to the Tiger Boutique and Haberdashery

Jodee Cronk teaches French at Grand Junction High School. In 2017, the principal, Ari



Goldberg, talked to Jodee about designing and implementing a servicelearning advisory program, later dubbed the Agents of Change, made up of students who want to make the world a better place. The program accepted its first applicants in 2018. That fall, the group of ten freshmen held a toiletries drive for the House, the local teen homeless shelter. Their drive was so successful that the House couldn't store all the donations. The students had the idea to store the excess in Jodee's classroom closet for

fellow students that might need them. Word quickly spread about the resource, and Jodee's closet became known as the Comfort Closet. They added donated clothing items, shoes, and school supplies and then Homecoming and Prom dresses. Over the years, the Comfort Closet has expanded and become the Tiger Boutique and Haberdashery, where Jodee and the Agents of Change work to offer basic necessities to students in need while removing the stigma of asking for help. During the first semester of this school year, the Tiger Boutique saw 374 documented visits by students.

Who is Dr. Morgan Medlock, the keynote speaker? In January, 2022, Dr. Medlock was appointed the Behavioral Health Commissioner for the State of Colorado and a member of the Governor's Cabinet. She is an emergency psychiatrist and addiction medicine specialist by training. Dr. Medlock previously served as the Chief Medical Officer and Director of Crisis and Emergency Services for the Washington, DC, Department of Behavioral Health. She also served on the faculty of the Massachusetts General Hospital Center for Law, Brain, and Behavior at Howard University College of Medicine and has held a previous appointment as a Clinical Fellow in Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School. Dr. Medlock's education includes an MD from the Mayo Clinic School of Medicine, her MPH from Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health, and her MDiv from Andrews University.

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# National AAUW Achievements in 2022

- ✓ In February, we partnered with the Eos Foundation to publish <u>The Women's</u> <u>Power Gap at Elite Universities: Scaling the Ivory Tower</u>, which found that only 22% of presidents at elite U.S. research universities are women, and a mere 5% are women of color.
- ✓ This fall, we the update of <u>The Simple Truth</u> shows that, using the new calculation, women were paid just 77 cents for every dollar paid to men in 2021.
- ✓ We supported and celebrated the confirmation of <u>Ketanji Brown Jackson</u>, the first Black justice to serve on the U.S. Supreme Court.
- ✓ Following the <u>Title IX 50th anniversary</u> in June, we celebrated in style with AAUW alumna and U.S. Attorney Rachael Rollins. And we worked in partnership with members and other organizations to ensure the new proposed rules issued by the Biden Administration strengthen this landmark legislation.
- ✓ Last November, we kicked off our yearlong celebration of <u>AAUW's 140th</u> <u>Anniversary</u> with a festive event to present the 2021 AAUW Alumnae Recognition Award to Dr. Ngozi Okonjo-Ileawa, the first woman and first African to serve as director-general of the World Trade Organization.
- ✓ This summer, the Coca-Cola Foundation renewed its support of our <u>Women's</u> <u>Economic Empowerment Initiative</u> for another year. This allowed us to expand our partnership with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs), and others to reach even more women with our award-winning Work Smart salary-negotiation program and financial literacy training.
- ✓ In May, we held our second successful all-virtual <u>National Conference for College</u> <u>Women Student Leaders</u>
- ✓ We Shared AAUW's Voice on Key Issues. From <u>podcasts</u> to <u>social media</u> to leading media outlets, we got the word out to everyone about the importance of our cause. This year's media mentions included the <u>Washington Post</u>, <u>ABC</u> <u>News</u>, <u>The Chronicle of Higher Education</u>, <u>The Miami Herald</u> and <u>Diverse Issues</u> <u>in Highered</u>.
- ✓ Because we kept up the pressure on Congress to pass the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act, in December the Senate passed the legislation as an amendment to the Omnibus Bill. This bill will:
  - Give pregnant workers access to basic accommodations like carrying a water bottle and taking bathroom breaks.
  - Clarify that it is unlawful to discriminate against pregnant workers by forcing them out of their jobs unnecessarily or denying them reasonable accommodations.
  - Prohibit employers from retaliating against pregnant workers who request accommodations



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
