The Western Colorado Conservation Corps' All-Women's Fire Crew with Marcus Kissner

The **All-Women's Fire Crew** was born out of a partnership between BLM and the Western Colorado Conservation Corps (WCCC) aimed at diversifying the historically male-dominated industry. It is a unique 10-month program that provides young women with an exceptional opportunity to learn and participate in wildland firefighting. The program is designed to teach young women (age 18-25) about firefighting, the use of firefighting equipment, and how to operate in challenging conditions effectively and safely. While participating in the program the women receive housing and a living wage. After the season, which runs March to November, participants gain their certification—known as their "red card"—and can begin applying for full-time firefighting jobs across the US.

Marcus Kissner is the Associate Director of WCCC, a division of the Mesa County Partners organization. Marcus is passionate about providing real world training and hands-on experience to members of the Corps. As a decorated combat veteran with tours in Iraq and Afghanistan, he is a natural leader for Corps members to look up to. In his free time, he enjoys playing baseball with his son or hunting on the Grand Mesa.

How AAUW Advances Our Priorities

- Unfortunately, the U.S. Department of Education has missed its own deadline to release final Title IX rules. AAUW joined 126 gender justice, survivor advocacy, and civil rights organizations in urging President Biden and the Department to take immediate action to finalize the new Title IX rules, which has now been significantly delayed twice. The new Title IX rules is expected to restore protections against sex-based discrimination, clarify protections for LGBTQ+ students, strengthen supports for pregnant and parenting students, and provide clarity on transgender students' participation in athletics. Until the new rules are issued, students continue to go to school under civil rights protections weakened under the Trump Administration. Look for ways to help us elevate this issue in the next few weeks.
- On October 25, the U.S. Senate Finance Committee held a <u>hearing</u> on "Exploring Paid Leave: Policy, Practice, and Impact on the Workforce." Advocates uplifted the critical importance of enacting a national paid family and medical leave program to support the economic security of workers, women, and families. <u>Urge your members of Congress to support paid leave</u>.
- Join AAUW on November 30 at 2 p.m. ET for a social media storm for Native Women's Equal Pay Day. #NativeWomensEqualPay
- AAUW submitted comments to the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) in support of further clarifying and strengthening the <u>proposed enforcement guidance</u> on Harassment in the Workplace.
- AAUW joined 17 members and partners of the Postsecondary Data Collaborative in a letter applauding steps by the U.S Department of Education to empower students and families to make informed decisions but providing information about program costs and outcomes for educational institutions.
- AAUW joined over 80 organizations in opposing a Senate appropriations bill amendment that would prohibit funding for implementation of <u>Executive Order on Promoting Access to</u> <u>Voting</u>. AAUW supports strong implementation of the Executive Order to make voter registration and participation more accessible for Americans.

News from AAUW National Headquarters

We want to start on a note of celebration. Last month, Harvard University economics professor Claudia Goldin, Ph.D., was awarded the Nobel Prize in economic sciences for her extensive research on gender differences in earnings (and she is only the 3rd woman to ever achieve this honor). As Dr. Goldin's research has shown, progress on closing the gender pay gap is stubborn and uneven. For example, Native American women have one of the largest wage gaps in the country, earning only 55 cents per dollar paid to the average white man.

Dr. Goldin's work focuses on long-term change, and we stand with her in the ongoing fight to ensure all women receive equal pay for equal work. We invite you to celebrate Professor Goldin's outstanding achievement by joining our continued fight for gender equity.

Our nation's schools face longstanding challenges in preventing and effectively responding to instances of bullying and harassment. AAUW's research has shown alarming rates of harassment, bullying and assault in schools and on campuses. Research also shows that LGTBQ+ young people experience higher rates of bullying than their non-LGBTQ+ peers. Bullying and harassment interfere with a student's ability to achieve high standards and have a significant impact on GPAs, school attendance, dropout rates, and likelihood of completing college. Simply put, students can't learn if they do not feel safe. Ask your representative to support the Safe Schools Improvement Act!

The Safe Schools Improvement Act would establish federal standards to protect every student from bullying and harassment in K-12 schools, regardless of actual or perceived race, color, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, or religion. It would also require states to report data on incidents of bullying and harassment to the U.S. Department of Education.

A number of AAUW-endorsed bills were reintroduced in Congress in September:

- The <u>Schedules That Work Act</u> and <u>Part-Time Worker Bill of Rights Act</u> would give workers more certainty about their hours and incomes and strengthen protections and benefits for part-time workers.
- The <u>Tyler Clementi Higher Education Anti-Harassment Act</u> would require colleges and universities receiving federal funding to establish anti-harassment policies prohibiting harassment and bullying based on sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, and more.
- The <u>Student Loan Deferment for Sexual Violence Survivors Act</u> would create a student loan deferment option for survivors of sexual violence and sex-based harassment who temporarily withdraw from their school for mental and physical health rehabilitation.
- On September 27, the U.S. Department of Education (ED) released <u>final regulations on the</u> <u>Gainful Employment (GE) rule</u> to protect students enrolled in career training programs from unaffordable student debt. The new regulations will also increase transparency about the cost of higher education programs. AAUW has advocated for these regulations to help safeguard students against predatory practices. Under the GE rule, a program loses access to federal funds if it repeatedly leaves its graduates with unaffordable debts, relative to their earnings.
