WHAT YOU MISSED LAST MONTH

It is too bad that more members were unable to make this meeting. Learning about the WCCC's (Western Colorado Conservation Corps) All-Women Fire Crew was very enlightening. The program is a division of the Partners organization. The speaker was Marcus Kissner, the Associate Director of the program, and who also does much of the training.

WCCC had been training men in fire fighting for several years in conjunction with the BLM. In 2019 a separate women's crew was started as the BLM wanted to incorporate more women into the program. This coming year there will be an additional Women's crew working with the US Forest Service.

WCCC recruits nationwide for women from 17 to 25 years old. Candidates must pass a personal interview, a medical screening, a PAC test and a physical exertion test in order to be accepted. Marcus said that the women come from various backgrounds...some right from high school, some form other jobs, some college grads...and one who was taking a gap year before entering med school. So far, there have been 34 graduates of the program and 2 dropouts.

The training begins in May and goes 12-13 weeks until about Thanksgiving. Trainees not only learn to use chain saws, but work on various projects such as clearing brush. The training is geared to BLM standards for persons to receive a "Red Card", which would certify that the person has sufficient experience with firefighting. Persons holding a Red Card can easily join the men on other fire crew jobs with various agencies, or become land managers. The extensive WCCC program is one of only 3 in the US; the others are in California and Oregon.

During training the women receive a "living wage"...but have to pay for their own food and housing. WCCC staff helps them find communal apartments. There is no medical insurance for them. Funds to pay them come from a grant. However, in case of an active fire, they may be reassigned to BLM to go fight the fire in which case they become a temporary employee of BLM.

News from AAUW Action Network

Last week, the U.S. Department of Education released the Civil Rights Data Collection which provides key data and analysis pertaining to educational equity. "Sadly, the inequities that have long persisted in our education system are on full display," commented Education Secretary Miguel Cardona.

All children should have equal opportunity to succeed. <u>Ask Congress to invest in keeping all</u> <u>kids safe at school and support students to ensure their educational success.</u>

The latest findings show that Black students are more likely to attend schools staffed with law enforcement, but without counselors, social workers, nurses, or school psychologists. Law enforcement in schools doesn't lead to safer schools, it leads to students with disabilities and students of color being disproportionately criminalized. Just look at the numbers:

•Black girls make up 16% of the female student population but were 39% of girls arrested in school.

Native American girls had a school arrest rate 3.5 times that of White girls.
Students with disabilities were arrested at a rate 2.9 times that of students without disabilities.

Let's be clear: Disproportionately high disciplinary rates for students of color and students with disabilities constitutes discrimination. This is why AAUW supports the <u>Counseling Not</u> <u>Criminalization in Schools Act</u>.

The Counseling Not Criminalization in Schools Act establishes a \$5 billion grant program to invest in school districts that remove law enforcement so that schools can provide adequately trained personnel and trauma informed services to improve the learning environment for children and prohibits the use of federal funds to support the hiring, recruitment, and placement of police officers on K-12 school campuses.

Ask your member of Congress to support federal funding for school counselors, nurses and social workers, not school-based law enforcement.
