PROGRAM: The Grand Valley Resettlement Program with Bob Hedlund

Bob Hedlund is the Founder and President of Joint Development Associates International, Inc. He earned a B.S. in Mining Engineering from the Colorado School of Mines in 1975 and founded JDA in 1992. Bob and the JDA staff strive to act as catalysts for transformation, facilitating families in providing for themselves.



Bob has been involved in rebuilding communities in Uzbekistan since 1992, northern Afghanistan since 2001 and Northern Iraq since 2017. He has enabled rural communities to rebuild their infrastructure, construct new schools and homes, and promote efficient and appropriate farming techniques. Over 200,000 farmers have been trained in new crops and mechanized farming methods.

In light of the Taliban's takeover of Afghanistan in August 2021, JDA and Help the Persecuted collaborated to evacuate 101 families, comprising 568 individuals, to Abu Dhabi in October 2021. In response to the crisis, JDA established the **Grand Valley Resettlement Program** (**GVRP**) to assist families in relocating to the Grand Valley. This initiative has brought together over 300 volunteers and 18 churches, as well as various civic groups, resulting in the successful resettlement of 15 families.

Bob and his wife have two children, Jonathan and Jaala, who are both pursuing their passions in Denver and overseas. Bob and Cathy now reside in Grand Junction, Colorado.

YWHAT YOU MISSED LAST MONTH

AAUW's visit to the La Plaza headquarters on March 11 was very eye-opening. It all started in 1954 when some fruit growers' wives joined forces to improve the living conditions of the migrant workers. In 1969 those efforts coalesced into what eventually became Child and Migrant Services. As conditions and laws changed, the idea of establishing a welcoming community where newcomers could find a sense of belonging resulted in the non-profit organization...La Plaza, a name which refers to the open plaza in every South American hometown.

La Plaza facilitates members' access to resources such as health clinics, tax prep, hunger & economic relief programs, navigation of legal systems, interpretation and translations. They provide transportation to La Plaza for resource nights and social activities. They try to remove obstacles and provide support so that the member may enjoy the best quality of life.

In order to connect with migrant and immigrant families, La Plaza has an extensive outreach program, visiting worksites to find people to help. They have a small fleet of vans which can be used for transporting members to various appointments, as needed. La Plaza interacts with various other non-profits, churches and agencies, such as Marillac Clinic.

La Plaza's budget last year was about \$400,00. Major funding comes from various other non-profits such as Community Foundation and Colorado Immigrant Rights Coalition.

La Plaza operates out of a small building in Palisade, which houses a commercial kitchen and a smallish meeting room as well as offices, and food and clothing distribution areas. They also routinely make large batches of tamales which are available for sale to the public.
