Consider these: recently-moved apartment dwellers; young, mobile, (less-motivated?) voters; the incarcerated population who are not actively serving sentences; recently naturalized citizens - many of these could use that extra push from you to vote.

Here's where to start.

<u>Vote411</u> (League of Women Voters) has personalized registration and ballot information.

<u>AAUW Voter Issues Guide</u> has national issues we care about. Also on that page - the Congressional voting record - how did our electeds do? And coming October 4, the Head-To-Head guide, comparing national candidate views on AAUW issues.

AAUW's voter engagement campaign, It's My Vote!, exists to empower you to lead voter education and registration efforts on the ground, in your community. Explore our <u>Voter Issue Guide</u>. Tune into AAUW's social media channels for election-related content every Tuesday and share with your networks. Plan a watch party for the presidential debate (September 10).
