<u>AAUW in Action:</u> AAUW acts on a range of issues that align with our Public Policy Priorities through engaging our action network, advocating through social media, and signing coalition letters. In the first few weeks of the 119th Congress, we have endorsed letters on protecting Title IX and education equity (opposing Linda McMahon's nomination as U.S. Secretary of Education), civil rights (opposing H.R.28 and EO 14166), economic security (supporting the Job Protection Act), and reproductive rights.

On March 8, 2025, please remember to celebrate **International Women's Day** under the theme, "For ALL women and girls: Rights. Equality. Empowerment."

The first International Women's Day (IWD) was held in March 1911. This year's theme calls for action that can unlock equal rights, power and opportunities for all. Central to this vision is empowering the next generation—youth, particularly young women and adolescent girls—as catalysts for lasting change.

As Ruth Bader Ginsburg said: "As women achieve power, the barriers will fall. As society sees what women can do, as women see what women can do, there will be more women out there doing things, and we'll all be better off for it."

IWD isn't country, group or organization specific. It's a day of collective global activism and celebration that belongs to all those committed to forging gender equality.

While International Women's Day is marked worldwide, some countries have declared IWD as an official holiday, including: Angola, Armenia, Cambodia, China, Cuba, Kazakhstan, Laos, Madagascar, Mongolia, Montenegro, Nepal, Russia, Uganda, Ukraine, and Zambia. Surprisingly, the United States is not yet on this list.

Notably, the year 2025 is a pivotal moment as it marks the 30th anniversary of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action. This document is the most progressive and widely endorsed blueprint for women's and girls' rights worldwide that transformed the women's rights agenda in terms of legal protection, access to services, youth engagement, and change in social norms, stereotypes and ideas stuck in the past.

- The declaration was also the first global policy document on women that included a specific focus on girls' rights.
- Before 1995, only 12 countries had legal sanctions against domestic violence. Today, there are 1,583 legislative measures in place across 193 countries, including 354 targeting domestic violence specifically.
- Today, there are 112 countries with National Action Plans on women, peace and security—a significant increase from only 19 in 2010.k

It is a day when women are recognized for their achievements without regard to divisions, whether national, ethnic, linguistic, cultural, economic or political.

A sub-theme for IWD is "Accelerate Action ", which is a worldwide call to acknowledge strategies, resources, and activity that positively impact women's advancement, and to support and elevate their implementation.

As individuals, we can all take steps in our daily lives to positively impact women's advancement. We can call out stereotypes, challenge discrimination, question bias, celebrate women's success, and so much more. Additionally, sharing our knowledge and encouragement with others is key.
